Four Key Elements in The Conversation

1. Incarnation

3. Confrontation

2. Reputation

4. Transformation

Incarnation

The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth. – *John 1:14*

Jesus was God with skin, living in his mission field, pointing people to the Father

We are followers of Jesus, living in his mission field, pointing people to the Father

² Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. ³ And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. ⁴ Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should. – *Colossians 4:2-4*

Any conversation <u>about</u> Jesus should start with a conversation <u>with</u> Jesus (vs. 2)

What am I praying for? (vs. 3-4)

Open doors (if God opens the door, I don't need to kick it in!)

Bold <u>proclamation</u> (does not infer screaming or arguing)

Crystal clarity (the message of Jesus should be simple and clear)

Reputation

⁵Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. ⁶Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone. - *Colossians 4:5-6*

Every conversation is an opportunity to model and speak of Jesus (vs. 5)

You don't need to "bring Jesus into every conversation." If you're a follower of Jesus, and Jesus is in you, he's already there!

Reputation, continued

God <u>assumes</u> that you'll be having the conversation (vs. 6)

God instructs that our conversation must always be gracious (vs. 6)

You create more opportunity with conversation than you do with condemnation

Seasoned with salt (vs. 6) - "a sprinkling of truth that enhances the flavor of grace." We are not supposed to assault people with our conversation

An answer (vs. 6) implies that a question has been asked; in order to hear the question you have to listen

You don't need all the answers; you just need to find them (vs. 6)

Major Barriers that Keep Us from The Conversation

I'm not wired that way

I am afraid I won't have the right answers

I am afraid of being rejected

I really don't care

I don't have a faith worth giving away
